A Message from J. Martin Westermeyer

Before I shared some spiritual nugget with you this month, I wanted to address a more pragmatic question. One of the things in this life that we don't control is the weather. It seems that cold, no, frigid temperatures, snow and ice will be controlling our travel – or lack thereof for the immediate future. If the weather on a Sunday morning feels that it is not conducive for safe travel – at least to you – then stay home! I fully understand AND I pray that you stay safe. It is more important to me and the leadership of the congregation that you are safe and able to be with us another time.

We are preparing to enter into the second month of the year – and I'm wondering what's going on? Ash Wednesday isn't til next month – what am I supposed to do with February? I'm used to working on things for Lent and toward Easter – but not this year!

Then, I ran across a devotional that used the following verse, and those words spoke to me as a Pastor, counselor, mentor, friend and fixer.

From Daniel 3:24b-25: *They replied, "Certainly, Your Majesty." He said, "Look! I see four men walking around in the fire, unbound and unharmed, and the fourth looks like a son of the gods."*

No matter what title I use, deep down I'm a fixer.

This is especially apparent when a loved one, friend or parishioner is in trouble. I want to know how I can make it better. I sometimes offer advice without people asking for it. I'll offer to mediate a conversation or research a solution, even if no one asked me to.

I do anything I can to push people toward a final resolution. This fixer mentality was especially disorienting when I started studying to be a minister and sometime spiritual director.

Although the name might indicate otherwise, ministers and spiritual directors aren't supposed to tell people how to live or fix their lives. Instead, we journey with people as they look for God's presence and seek God's wisdom for themselves.

Many ministers prefer to call this work spiritual accompaniment, because we aren't showing up to change outcomes but to provide a contemplative companion.

Folks in my life most often need me to make space to listen more than they need my interference or unsolicited advice. When someone is in distress, someone showing up for them can be their miracle.

In the Daniel text, the divine presence with Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego, could have easily put the fire out, but instead, walked in the fire with them. And the divine presence alone was enough to save them from harm.

It's a spiritual practice to show up for someone—exactly how they need it, when they need it—without making it about your own ego and own desire for a quick fix—to keep one's eye on the long-term goal.

As we journey through this month of February (without any liturgical holidays) – we need to take on this spiritual practice in some way: show up for each other, listen to each other, make no judgement call, and be together as people of faith.

I look forward to seeing you in Worship this month of February as we embrace each other not only in friendship, but in the Christian love we profess. May we know Christ's presence as we gather in fellowship and Worship.

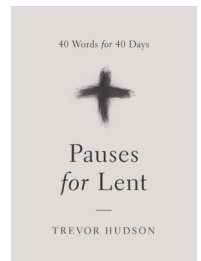

AN ORDINARY DAY

January 10th, 1939. It seemed like an ordinary day on the west side of Newport. It was a Tuesday afternoon. Epiphany Sunday was celebrated two days prior on the 8th. The weather was good for winter — cloudy with prospects of late rain. Church scoutmaster, Louis Crawford, was no doubt prepping for the regular Tuesday meeting. Scoutmasters are a hearty and dedicated brotherhood. And standing outside St John Evangelical on 7th Street — the church standing on the northwest corner of 7th and Columbia — saw wisps of smoke above the roof over the east wing. Oh my. That is NOT good. The Gothic church built in 1853 was a tremendous structure of wood with a brick facade. Even at that date, the lumber probably came from primeval forests of Michigan.

Mr. Crawford ran to the manse to tell Rev Barkhau — now in his eighth year serving St. John. The manse stood and still stands at 709 Columbia. It fell to Mrs. Barkhau to phone the Newport Fire Department, which stood where it does now— just a few blocks away. Fire Chief Edward Miles and the crew responded within the hour. And what he saw was not good. Fire in a Victorian church spreads rapidly. He summoned the fire chiefs and crews from Covington, Dayton, and Ft. Thomas. All hands.

Neighbors no doubt were on the sidewalks fearing for their own brick and timber homes. Newport houses are just a matter of 5-6 feet apart and the photographer for the Kentucky Post, Charles Nerpel, was right on site to capture that famous photo of the 50-foot steeple falling to the west, right onto the main portion of the two-story sanctuary. The steeple collapsing into the beautiful second story sanctuary of the historic church captured the tragedy of the fire as mere words could not.

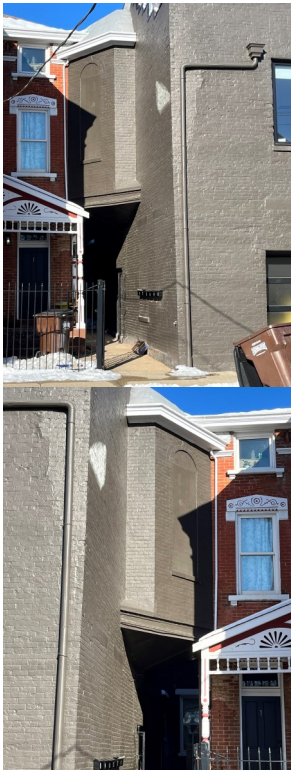
Accounts in the newspaper said that the ‘aerial truck crew’ — ladder boys? — battled for hours. They were on scene before the steeple’s collapse. The ladders were removed just in time, or they too would have been lost. Falling bricks threatened the men and one fireman, Edward Young, was injured but continued to work with the crew — including some from the neighboring towns. Another factor inhibiting their work was low water pressure from the hydrants. The fight to save and contain took four hours in total.

Volunteers helped save the manse and other houses. Of note, Mary Barkhau, oldest child of Rev. and Mrs. Barkhau was ill with bronchitis and was carried by Lillian Hughes down the street to 723 Columbia, the home of family doctor Dr. Clarence Hughes. Let’s hear it for good neighbors and church members.

The fire chiefs concluded that sparks from the old flues of the coal heating system were at fault, by igniting the rafters. Of note, the nests of pigeons in the church's attic rafters was cited as a factor in the rapid spread of flames. The manse and the neighboring house of Mr. Milius — both suffered smoke damage appraised at \$500 (modern day equivalent \$11,000). But the damage to the church was \$75,000 (\$1,650,000 in today's dollars). And these were at a time when the Great Depression was still in force.

The very next day, church leadership, chaired by President Albert C. Keeler, gathered in a member's home with the question: Can we rebuild, or do we need to consider another site? With a membership of 500, leadership wasted no time. A meeting of the congregation was called for January 29th at First Baptist (8th and York). Rev. Barkhau led services on Sunday in the high school auditorium, a block to the south. While the confirmation's weekly class would be postponed, the Ladies Aid Society choir would meet per schedule at the homes of a member and the Galileans would meet at the Congregational church a block away (it still stands). Monetary donations came in immediately from folks with no connection to St. John's. As a result of the fire, property owners were encouraged to have their flues inspected to prevent fires.
